Most of all to share a wonderful meal together and hear personal honor songs of many individuals. As you know the Mandaree paper has always given some history of our Hiracca ways of life, so for some who wish to keep this information. If your mother is a member of the Hiraaca and Mandan tribe; you are a member of your mother's clan. You are what your mother is. If your father is a Prairie Chicken Clan you're a Prairie Chicken Child, you're not his clan. Again, you are what your mother is. Your father's clan brothers and sisters are your clan aunt (ishawii) and Clan father (aadu). When you select a clan child for the warbonnet parade dance you choose a child of your clan brother or clan sister. For example; (when selecting someone; if you are a flint knife clan member than you will select one of your brother's children, you look for a baby knife clan (nagaa). Same way with your clan sister, you select a baby knife (nagaa). The clan aunt (ishaawii) and clan father (aadu) will ask their clan children for help, they will call on their

and Mandan people. To help us learn about our Hiraaca ways of life a clanship class was held at the Water Chief Hall recently. This picture was taken by Jordan Fox.

Randy Phelan, our council representative is fluent in our Hiraaca language. The West Segment community sponsored this class and as the schedule permits other classes will be held as well.

The people of the Hiraaca and Mandan tribes have clanships.

The Three Clan: Naagi Raawi:

Apuhga –Migaa: Low Cap Maxoxoadi: Alkalai Lodge Mee-cii-Rooga: Flint Knife

The Four Clan: Naagi Dooba:

A wa-xee: Dripping Dirt lidii-Shuhga: Wide Ridge Ciicga: Prairie Chicken Miri-Baadi: Water Buster

West segment had a class in March of 2015 back then, it was good to see our younger ones so willing to learn what they can about our culture. Which is exactly what these classes are all about, so if you want to learn more about your own culture you are certainly welcome to come over to the Water Chief Hall when these classes are scheduled.

Again, we will keep you posted on the schedule of the next class. We will have posters posted around our community and have the information on our West Segment face book page.

The family/clanship system among the Hiraaca and Mandan is an essential part of our culture. The clan system defines who is a member and what role one has in the family and tribe. The clan system also defines how one must conduct her/himself within the family, clan and tribe. It is who we are and how we live our sacred

The clanship system is based on the mother's lineage. You are your mother's clan. The line continues and perpetuates from the mother. In contrast many European cultures rely on sons to perpetuate the family lineage. Hiraaca's rely on having daughters to ensure the perpetuity of the clans and the people.

From birth a Hiraaca child is a part of a family, extended family, clan and the Nation. The family and clan relatives are responsible for the behavior, education, and well-being of the children and its members. It is extremely important to maintain proper behavior within the clan. The members' role includes helpfulness, graciousness, protection, education, guidance, discipline and nurturing.

It is also very important to know and respect your father's clan. You are a child of your father's clan. The ishaawii (Aunt) or Father (Aadu) in your father's clan is always acknowledged first in any honoring or giveaway ceremony that you do. The gifts given to your father's clan are for respect, honor and for your preparations for the journey into the next world. The gifts are some of your best items and are symbolic of what you will take into the next world. Everything you donate to your Clan father and aunt are what you will take when you pass into the next world.

An ishaawii (aunt) or Aadu (father) are very special to us because it is from them that you will choose to be the person to send you into the next world. The modern title for this is the "senior pallbearer". Long ago, they were the ones to prepare your body and take care of you by prayers, talking to you and sending you into the next world. The gifts or donations hung up by the family for you at your wake are also "taken with you on your journey into the next world to share with all your relatives awaiting your arrival". It is not "payment" for the senior pallbearer, On the fourth day after your death, at sunrise, the family notifies the senior pallbearer to take down the donations and take them out. The senior pallbearer is responsible for them thereafter. When this is done, it is then that you can take them with you into the next world. The father's clan takes care of us in making this sacred journey; therefore, they are very respected, beloved and treasured clan, as is your own clan.

It is said that in the next world, all of our relatives and ancestors are awaiting our arrival with great joy. It is important, therefore, to ensure that we do not die under the influence of any drugs or alcohol or take your own life. Our people respect the Sacred life given us so we are warned not to waste it as we may find it difficult to join our people in the next world. Life is sacred and it is only a short time we are here, so we must treasure it and be good to one another.



March is Colorectal Cancer Awareness



Colorectal cancer is cancer that occurs in the colon or rectum. Sometimes it is called colon cancer, for short. The colon is the large intestine or large bowel. The rectum is the passageway that connects the colon to the anus.

Among cancers that affect both men and women, colorectal cancer. (cancer of the colon or rectum) is the second leading cause of deaths in the United States. Every year, about 140,000 Americans are diagnosed with colorectal cancer, and more than 50,000 people die from it. But this disease is highly preventable, by getting screened beginning at age 50.

Screening tests help prevent colorectal cancer by finding precancerous polyps (abnormal growths) so they can be removed. Screening also finds this cancer early, when treatment can be most effective.

What Can You Do:

- If you're aged 50 to 75 get screened for colorectal cancer regularly. If your between 76 and 85, ask your doctor if you should be screened.
- · Be physically active.
- Maintain a healthy weight.
- Don't drink too much alcohol.
- Don't smoke.

Fast Facts:

- Risk increases with age. More than 90% of colorectal cancers occur in people aged 50 and older.
- Precancerous polyps and colorectal cancer don't always cause symptoms especially at first. You could have polyps or colorectal cancer and not know it. That is why having a screening test is so important. If you have symptoms, they may include:
- Blood in or on the stool (bowel movement).
- Stomach pain, aches, or cramps that do not go away.
- Losing weight and you don't know why.

These symptoms may be caused by something other than cancer. If you have any of them, see your doctor.

- Some people are at a higher risk than others for developing colorectal cancer. If you think you may be at high risk, talk to your doctor about when and how often to get tested.
- There are several screening test options. Talk with your doctor about which is right for you.
- Colonoscopy (every 10 years).
- High-sensitivity guaiac fecal occult blood test (FOBT) or fecal immunochemical test (FIT) (every year).
- Sigmoidoscopy (every 10 years, with FOBT or FIT every three years).



- Sigmoidoscopy (every 10 years, with FOBT or FIT every three years).
- Sigmoidoscopy alone (every 5 years).
- Stool DNA Test (FIT-DNA) every one or three years.
- CT colonography (or virtual colonoscopy) every five years.

Prevention saves lives. Free flu shots for all ages and free colorectal screening kits for adults 50-75 years old.

This is a screening to see if you need a colonoscopy. TAT Administrative Leave granted receive a \$30 Visa Card upon completion.







Lent: Which Focus? Which Approach?



day for many people. The Churches fill up more on Ash Wednesday sometimes than any other day during the year, including Christmas and Easter.

Why is that? Some say it is because we get something free, ashes. I really don't believe this. I believe it is because deep down we know we are sinners, we don't always do good things and we come to receive ashes

with the intention of making an effort to start over and ask God to help us. The focus is on the wrong we have done and the effort I must do in order not to do these things wrong again. Yes, there is value in this focus but I believe a different focus will bring about better and lasting results.

Instead of spending all our energy to stop doing the wrong we do (of course we must spend energy trying) why not spend more energy in learning how to love God. In the end, this approach will inspire us to try to avoid doing wrong things as well. How so? Let's compare the two approaches. When we focus on our sinfulness what happens interiorly? In my experience, I find that I mainly focus on me. I see my mistakes, my sins, my shortcomings, my inadequacies which eventually leads me into that endless pit of despair, low self-esteem and those ugly feelings of being a failure who will probably not go to heaven. These ugly painful feelings motivate me to "try" to get out of this disgusting pit so I focus on what I must do in order not to do these wrong things again which will eventually get me out of this pit. Notice the focus is still on me, myself and I. When I was younger, I too desired to receive ashes on Ash Wednesday because ashes reminded me of just how bad and ugly I am. I needed a boost once again to get me to make more of an effort to get myself out of this hideous pit. And then, beings I am in church, I would pray "Oh, by the way God I could really use your help!" implying, help me focus more on myself. Which only leads me deeper into the pit. Yuk! Enough! I think we can get the picture!

So what does it look like interiorly when we use the alternate approach and focus on how to love God more? In my experience, I have found that as I love God more I lose the desire to do wrong things. Why? There is a principal of love we can all relate to. When two people fall in love, they start out as acquaintances which leads to friends which leads to best friends which leads to being in love. As each stage of

Ash Wednesday seems to be a big||love deepens so does a desire to please each other, a desire to not offend each other, a desire to not do any wrong towards each other. In the end love leads these two people to do anything for each other, no matter what, even to the point of hardship and pain.

> When I was a little boy, I remember testing God to see if he was really there: "If you are really there, make it rain today." and it rained. The next day I prayed for no rain, and there was none. The third day I prayed for rain again and I felt one drop-one of those North Dakota five foot rains, a drop every five feet. I now established the acquaintance stage.

> My love for God deepened through religion classes for I learned more of who God is. In my college years, I attended a retreat which stirred up powerful feelings. This really deepened my love for God and I made a commitment to never lose touch with God. I wanted God to be my friend and hopefully my best friend. Interiorly not to do wrong things. My focus was changing from just looking at myself to looking to God. Of course I had to look at myself, but now my focus was not so much on getting out of that dreadful pit as it was on finding ways to get closer to God, ways to love God more. As my love deepened, I reached a point where I wanted to make a lifelong commitment to God with all my heart and mind, soul and strength. This commitment happened when I walked down the aisle of the Cathedral of the Holy Spirit in Bismarck for my ordination to the priesthood on May 28, 1998.

> When love deepens, it becomes purified and the desires for self disappear. We ask, "Why would anyone want to do wrong against the one they love?" "Why would anyone want to do wrong against God who is love itself." We have now reached the same goal as the other approach that is getting rid of those things we do wrong. However, the emotional feelings of each approach are totally opposite of each other.

> I have to admit that as the years have gone by, my focus on Ash Wednesday still uses both approaches. But I can say that I spend more time and energy learning how to love God more than on myself. The emotions associated with "the pit" are much much less. More and more I experience feelings God's love and acceptance of me. He really does want to be my friend and is not keeping track of the times I do wrong. I know choose Lenten disciplines (those things we give up for lent) that help me love God more. Lent is much more delightful now than it used to be. What focus, which approach

will you apply in your Lenten disciplines this year?

He was with the 1st Force Service Regimen, 5th Marine Regimen Bravo Company 1st Battalion in Camp Pendleton, California. Virgil also served in Que-Son Vietnam and the 1st Recon Battalion. He was awarded the Vietnam Service Medal, Combat, National Defense, Expedition, Good Conduct, Expert Rifleman, Sharpshooter, Marksman and Corporal Medals.

Virgil was a Ruff Neck upon his return to Fort Berthold in which he lived and loved the thrill of his career with his many hardworking partners

whom shared many stories of hardship, near disaster, triumph and tears through long days and nights. In 1983 Virgil lived his passion of being a coach in the Golden Gloves Boxing in which lasted up until his death. He enjoyed coaching disadvantaged children and relatives whom sought to better and become champions. Long hours of training, blood, sweat and tears committed to the betterment of the youth, is what Virgil enjoyed along with his companions throughout the years.

Virgil was an entrepreneur and enjoyed his many adventures throughout his life. Some of his childhood and teenage stories remain to be told, but they say, "What happened in Bear Den stays in Bear Den".
