Whether that's dealing with our elements or dealing with finances. They do what they do and make the best of what they have. During the trying times we have gone through this past year with COVID-19 many people came to realize the importance and the appreciation of a rancher and farmer. Both can't be done without having a cowboy on hand to help them or a good ranch hand.

With that in mind, I would like to introduce one rancher from our West Segment community

who has worked hard all his life to get to where he is at today. His given Indian name is "Does Good" which was given to him by old man Pete Coffey. His English name is Ivan Johnson, he was born to the late Melvin and Eloise (Mandan) Johnson in Richardton, North Dakota. According to Ivan he states; "My parents had five boys and four girls there was a baby girl who passed away as an infant. There are now five deceased in our family."

Ivan is a lifelong resident of the Mandaree community. He lives on his ranch with his family which is located a few miles east outside of Mandaree. He continues to live where he grew up.

As we visited I asked Ivan how his childhood was like when he was growing up. His reply was;

Councilwoman Turner-Long Fight Update

Thanks to Chairman Fox, whom will be assisting with funding to start developing our community of Mandaree. We have picked out the locations for our new community center, which will be on the hill south of Lorraine Howe residence. The assistant living quarters will be located east of the our new Fire/EMT station. The area where the Veterans' building was to be built; will become a ice skating rink due to the fact that it is wet land area. We are still looking for a location to put up a skate park. There are new horse pits up on Buffalo Bird Woman park which is located north of the Celebration ground. We hope to place a play ground in the park. In the near future, we will relocate the White Oak Trailer area by moving every other trailer, this will give room for our children and residences to have a yard. With that said, there will be a new trailer park south– west of Fimbers residence. Some of the other trailers will be rent to own with those residents who applied and received homesite leases.

The house on 22 will be our total immersion school facilities and we hope to be open by August 15, 2021. This building will also be the new facilities for the MHA Land & Livestock quarters.

I would like to thank the Beautification program for helping us clean up the southeast part of Mandaree. The Mandaree Community Board will be developing an Ordinance for Mandaree community in the near future, to include; ATV usage on our street, curfew, animal control~ dogs & horses mainly. Our street light should be going up soon, speed bumps & speed limit signs in the community and on our BIA roads.

School starts August 16th, West Segment will be working hand in hand with the Mandaree School and the TAT Education Department to put on a big bash for a great school year.

Some of the TBC took a trip to Las Vegas to visit with the architect and business developments on the 8 acre lot,

from one council member who attended it sounded like the TAT could make an enormous revenue. I will know more and give an update in next month's paper. Elder disbursement in the amount \$2,000 July 19-20, 2021 activities for Elders have not been determined yet. General Public is around August 23, 2021.

The Education Department is getting up and moving at this time we have no director so I will be assisting to get the Education Department moving in the right direction. I would like individual TAT enrolled members who need their high school diplomas to call 759.3016 and sign up with Lorretta. She will than give me names and I will set up a meeting with you all and get you moving to receive your high school diploma; more information to follow. Mr. Lloyd Vigen is the new Director for the MHA Land & Livestock Corp., the plans for the slaughterhouse and cattle feed lot are still in the plans for our community.

I would like to give a shout out to our Coolsys our service provider for all our plumbing, air conditioning, heating, lighting etc. service. Co owner is Mike Tobin, who has provided us with a lot of service in the C.A.R.E. building (old MEC building) Mike said to me; I believe in what CARE is doing for your community so all the work I did for the building I am writing it off. (this saved West Segment a lot of money). When he told me that tears fell from my eyes, I was so lost for words, all I could do was thank him over and over again. If you see him around the community fixing things give him a shout out with a big thank you! I would like to congratulate Delaine Clairmont as the new Mandaree School Board member. Just a reminder, we only take care of medical needs, but with that said, anyone that has come to the West Segment admin or to myself we help out if we can. I know we don't have money to give out but we do help out in supplemental ways. Congratulations to the Mandaree volunteer Department for receiving an monitory gift for their department; great job Marley and crew. In closing, I would like to mention, I do make a point to attend all the committee meetings at the tribe. I chair the cultural committee and I am a member on the Education committee. I would like to remind everyone if you didn't get vaccinated, please do! We need to protect our kids and everyone around us.

This young cowboy first started in rodeo at the age tender age of four. He first rode sheep, then moved onto calves, then steers and now he rides bulls. From that time when he was four years old, Kasen worked hard at it in rodeos. He had a lot of support from

his parents. As Kasen states; "I had to give it my all and work hard to get it done. I had a lot of help and support from my family and community." Kasen's hard work and dedication has paid off he now has earned a great reputation in the rodeo circuit for being an outstanding bull rider. Cowboying & Ranching An Amazing & Hard Way of Life

“My childhood was ok we were pretty poor but we didn’t think to much about it that’s the way it was. That’s the way everybody was back then. We all got along we didn’t know any other way. We would go to the neighbors to ride horseback. We were outside all the time very seldom were we in the house. We

didn’t have much to do back then, I used to pick berries with my brothers and we pushed old tires around so those were our toys, he laughs.”

Living here in North Dakota we have some hard winters. Me and Ivan talked about the difficult winters here at home; “In the winter time we couldn’t get out of our place. We had a lot of snow they didn’t open our roads up like they do today. We just had a car trail coming into our house, we were always snow bound. It was hard to get to school and if you wanted to go to school you had to walk about a mile to catch the bus. As hard as it was, we always managed to have food, it was tough times but we didn’t know any other way. No running water or electricity in our old house for a long time. We had an outhouse and a wood stove in the house. I chopped more wood than a lumberjack back then.”

A lot of us have been raised in many different ways and some of the teachings we were taught were taught in different ways too. In Ivan’s case seemed like all of his teachings were a given meaning naturally. As he goes onto to say; “ I don’t ever remember my mom and dad telling us to do this or to do that. We just followed what they did, well that’s the way your supposed to do it. Anytime they needed help we were there to help. I remember if I did something wrong or if I wasn’t acting right, they never really scolded me and I don’t remember getting a whipping, which I probably should have many times. He pauses and laughs. Then goes onto to say; “All they would say to me is I’m going to get grandpa George, then I remember hiding under the bed a few times. As he laughs, and goes onto to say; “It was a given it was naturally there, we didn’t have to be told all the time. They would always tell us we’re going to get your uncle they would make you behave. Grandpa George was the one I was afraid of all he had to do was look at me and you knew you done something wrong. I remember I got so mad at him one time, I always wanted a pair of saddlebags and finally my mom could afford one so I finally got some saddlebags and I was so proud of them. One time, I was with my dad and grandpa George they were out hunting prairie chickens and I was playing with my saddlebags in the back and I noticed something was in there so I opened it up, and here there was a baby bottle with a nipple on it. Oh man I was mad. Anyway, I knew right away

Grandpa George was the one who did that. I can still remember right where we were at to when that happened”.

In growing up we all have people in our lives who we look up too so I asked Ivan who he looked up too and this is what he had to say; “ I looked up to my dad, I was always with my dad hunting or my brother Myron, who got killed in Viet Nam, he was hunter and we would always go out hunting. Like I said, we didn’t take a spanking or like that we just watched what the elders were doing. I guess it sets in your mind. I never seen them do anything wrong so it must’ve been right. When we needed to go somewhere we always got there, we always had groceries, we never had anything fancy. I remember we got a black and white TV it was all snowy you couldn’t see it anyways to me that was something. We never had a lot but we were happy. When we got home from school we had to chop wood for the wood stove and carried a lot of coal to the house. We had to haul our water from a well, we hauled water in buckets and filled up cream cans with more buckets.”

As we visited I asked Ivan how old he was when he started riding. He said; “I was around twelve years old or younger when I started riding horseback. I broke my arm right away when I started riding. I used to go to Grandpa George’s place across the coulee and ride horseback because we didn’t have any horses. I rode with Bruce a lot we used to ride all over up north and down south we rode all over the place out in the country. That was our fun and enjoyment riding horseback that’s all we had. When I got out of the eighth grade, I was riding and breaking horses for a guy north of New Town and at the same time I was working on a drilling rig. Then I went to Stanley where I was making pretty good money back then. So I would work during the summer months, It was so hard for me to go back to school, I hated school because I was making good money. Seem like to me it was a waste of time sitting there in school, when I could be making money. It was always so good to come back from work and give your folks some money, every one of my brothers did that for our folks. We always figured look how long they took care of us.

When I was in the 12th grade, I finally quit school. I left to work on a big ranch in Montana where they ran about 8, 000 head of cows. Then I went on to work for a guy up in Jordan, his name was Benny Binion he owned a big casino in Las Vegas called the Horse Shoe. Then I went to work at the Matador in Billings, Montana they ran about ten thousand head of cows. My brother Bernie was doing iron work in Texas and he asked me what I was doing. I told him I was working and making \$175.00 a month back then, that was a lot of money. My brother Bernie said come to Texas we’ll go iron working so I went down there for a while. We did some rodeoing down there and when we got home here we rodeoed a little.

If you grew up around horses and cattle or on a ranch and didn’t rodeo but you rode horse back everyday, and went on roundups, took care of horses and cows. Than you would know they’re two different kinds of cowboys. As Ivan explains; “there’s a ranch cowboy and a rodeo cowboy. I started riding well I’m gonna guess I must’ve been around fifteen or sixteen years old. Mandaree school had a

good rodeo team, I remember going to the National finals rodeo in Idaho in the bronc and bull riding. Other than that, we just rodeoed locally in NDRA and the Indian rodeos. I've been ranching now for the past nineteen years now. I got my first sixty-five head of cows when I was nineteen years old and I'm still ranching with cows and horses.

As we visited we talked about some of the teachings that Ivan remembers that helped him along his way in life and helped him be where he is at today. As Ivan goes onto to say; "I believe I got where I am today by watching my elders, learning how to work from them. It seems like the only way I was ever going to get anything was to have a job and make some money so that's what I learned from them old fellas. I always paid attention, watch them to see how they were doing things and how they conducted themselves, they've been there and done that."

In 1992 to 1996 Ivan was elected by our people here in Mandaree to be on our Tribal Business Council as our representative. We started visiting about some of the things he did while he was our representative. Ivan states; "Back then it seems like the lease money our people got was really important, there weren't that many jobs no oil lease monies. What I wanted to do was work more with improving the land as far as putting in water, doing some cross fencing, grass seeding, brush clearing stuff like that. We did not have the money like they do now. When I was on council, I started selling chances on a new dodge pickup so we could raise some extra monies to do some range improvements. I didn't run to the council and say I need this much money to do this, I just did it on my own. In my own opinion, I think that if you're on the council you should ask the people what they want or what they think is right or what they think should be done. Now it seems like they don't include the people, they just go ahead and build or buy multi-million buildings they just do it. Why don't they ask the people what they want. When I was on the council I was just a representative the people put in there in so they need to know or find out from them what they think. There's always somebody smarter. Everybody don't have oil money a lot of people don't with the money that's going out. Why don't they check on our people maybe somebody needs help that don't get any oil income. Or they don't have a job or they're old or they can't work. I think they're really forgetting these people. Your like a board member a representative your supposed to watch out for the people for their interests, they're the ones who put you on as their representative to watch out for your people. Today there's a lot more revenue they have more money a lot more income there that they never had before. It's hard to say but I still think they should still get out to the community and see what the people want and that goes for the whole council.

When Covid-19 was around it was a time the people in our world all came to a stand still. Many were isolated in their own homes. Employed people and elders all were home bound. It was definitely a different time for all of us a time we will not forget. Its still here so many of us continue to wear our masks when we go places just to be safe. While we visited, I asked him how he dealt with Covid and if there were any effects from it. This is what he had to say; "It hasn't really affected us here because we just stayed here on the ranch. We have so much to do here that we didn't go out a whole lot. Everyday we had things to take care of so we didn't go out to visit or anything.

Even if we could we just didn't have the time we were always so busy taking care of things here."

As I mentioned before, I've been ranching since I was nineteen years old today I have three hired men working and helping me. They're the best workers I have ever

seen, the best people. They're all Hispanic and very good workers. I asked Ivan how most of his days start out as he replied; "First thing in the morning I get a lot of phone calls so I take care of that. Then I still have a roustabout crew so we have to do our safety meeting right in the mornings. I get with the guys to see what they have going on for the day as far as in the oil field. Then it's right back to the ranch here feeding cattle and horses. We have a feed lot here and we usually feed six or seven hundred calves from October till Spring. Sometimes we just get done eying 148 head of heifers that we had in the feed lot all winter, we just hauled them out two days ago on pasture. Now we just found out we got blue algae in the water, I remember that happened a few years ago, north of here on boggy we lost five or six cows some of them went blind and some we had to abort their calves it's really bad. It's getting wild here in North Dakota right now, we're hauling fresh water down to the heifers because of blue algae. Then it's weening time then you have to give shots then calving starts. It's the same thing, your always busy taking care of your cows or horses. If it's 20 below out with a lot of snow you still got to take care of things no matter what. It's not an eight to five job it's everyday all the time".



Ivan has been very fortunate in his lifetime, he took the advice of an old man and lived by that. He has good people around him with good dependable help. We are all aware that things don't just come to us or are given to us most of us have to worked hard at an young age to get what we have or what we want. Much less save what we can. Nobody is perfect in this life but for most that know what it's like to work

most of your life, you get to a point where you appreciate what you worked hard for with the sacrifices you made along the way. Today Ivan is successful at what he does with the hard work he's done for many years along with the many sacrifices he's made. Yet he seemed a little modest when I asked him about being successful. He's a man who doesn't brag about what he has done being a successful rancher isn't an easy.

As Ivan replied; "It's constant, to me it ain't about how much money you make it's how much you can save. You might need something one day and it seems like your always broke if you can save a little then maybe you can buy it. An old fella told me that one time, he said Ivan it ain't how much money you make it's how much you can save. If you got extra pay something off so I worked at that most of my life. It was difficult you know but I don't think we were put here to have it easy. I've been fortunate, I have good people working for me we had the jobs, so any extra I made I kept saving and building up the place.

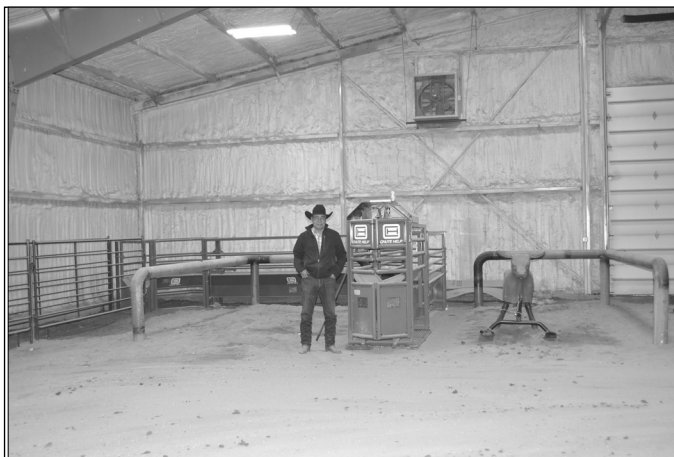
Today Ivan can see his blessings of appreciation in what he had worked so hard for. He still works but not so much physical and hard lifting work anymore. He does take it easy but has to make sure the work gets done so he keeps himself busy overseeing on a daily basis.

He has a soft spot for the younger kids that are trying to do something on their own. Ivan has taken upon himself to sponsor kids from here who participate in rodeos, or going to track meets, church organizations. As he says; "I know to well what it's like to try to rodeo and not have any help or sponsorship. I sponsor quite a few kids in a lot of different places. I know what it's like to have to struggle and if I see somebody really struggling and trying I think about what I went through. Now I'm in a position to help somebody so I help them and they appreciate it. He showed me around his place, we went to this building that is pictured

below. On his ranch he has a number of buildings all of which serve a purpose. The building pictured to your left is an inside arena. Ivan was open to sharing what these buildings are for. I asked Ivan what he planned on using this indoor arena for as he goes on to say; "Well the first several years it's been really cold here at that time, we were plowing roads here and everything so we just had equipment sitting in there. The arena is all heated and isolated so it made it pretty easy starting up our equipment. Now, it's all set up for any kind of indoor sport like; roping, riding broncs or whatever. It's open if somebody wants to come and use it, I'm okay with that. What I'd like to see is more younger kids doing more of this instead of playing on their games or phones all the time. That's good to they learn things but it would be good to have them actively doing something. If some kids want to come and do something yeah, it's open. I'd like to see some younger kids get involved in 4-H or any other kind of horse events, I'd help them. I know one thing our whole reservation has changed in that aspect. A long time ago, if I wanted to go to a dance or basketball game, I would have to get on a horse and ride to where I

wanted to go. It's pretty easy living now.

Recently, Ivan was selected to be on the board of directors for the Cowboy Hall of Fame headquartered in Medora, North Dakota. So we began visiting about that. I asked him how he felt

about being selected for the board. As he replied; "I was kinda surprised on why they would pick me you know, but there I go again I helped this association out a lot and I matched bronc riding in Sentinel Butte and the home on range for kids. I helped them because I think a lot of families here have had kids that got into trouble go there. I helped them out. As far as being on the Cowboy Hall of Fame Board, I think they always needed some representation from our reservation here. There's been a lot of good Indian ranchers and Indian cowboys from here and they don't get any kind of recognition. You know I want to try and see if I can get some of our people recognized. I know there's a lot more to our culture then just the cowboy end of it. There's a lot of traditional ways I don't know a whole lot about but I do respect every bit of it. You know, I would like to see some elders who know our history here and put something together so it could be displayed in the Cowboy Hall of Fame. There's a lot of things that come from our reservation so they can get in the right places where people can hear about it because there's a lot of people that go through that hall of fame, especially now that tourism is going on. If there's something I could do that would change it a little bit I'd like to see that. I like to see some of our people signed up to be members they would have a right to be on as a trustee. The trustee members actually pick the ones who get inducted into the Cowboy Hall of Fame, and that could be an older rancher, a contractor, older cowboy or a modern cowboy. Years ago, there was non-Indian ranchers here plenty of them leased up everything on the reservation and many of them ranchers went out and build big ranches in different places. Some of their ancestors are still here leasing land on our reservation. I can see where it was tougher for our own People to get financing there's a lot of knowable Native Americans who were ranchers but they just couldn't get financing and that was tough. Yeah, there was a lot of cowboys here and now you can't find anybody. I remember when you could get guys to come and help wrestle calves and brand. It's going and going fast and it seems like for native people everything evolved around livestock. It's really disappearing on our reservation and that's sad.

Hopefully we can get something going again and get some interest

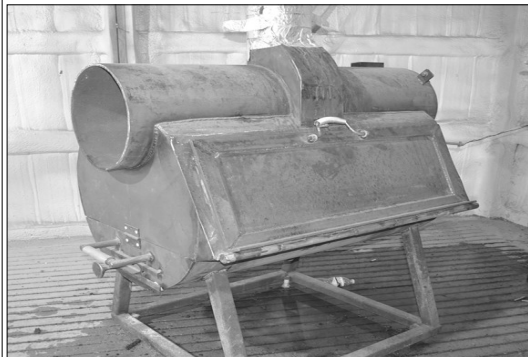
I know work ethics is a big thing now. Being on this board will be challenging, to oversee how things are going there's a lot involved. So far, we had one meeting it was more or less getting new members familiar with the board and introducing us. At the end of this month, we will go to Cheyenne Frontier Days they have get togethers lined up for us. Nelson Heart is the other new board member and Linda Baker is a trustee.

As we visited, we shifted our conversation and began visiting about some of the major changes here on our reservation. As Ivan goes onto say; it's our younger generation there's so much drugs, I see that as the biggest change here. It doesn't only affect the young people it affects parents, aunties, uncles, grandmas and grandpa's they all feel it. It's a tough go it seems like there more violence. I'd like to see the focus on what needs to be changed here in our community which is the drugs that really affects everybody. Look at the deaths we had here in Mandaree. You know I used to think diabetes would kill half of our people here on the reservation but it ain't anymore it's the drugs. If I could help make it better and this is just my idea. I would start some kind of activity that involved agriculture, ceremonies that's where people can come in and help. Bismarck has a program with a 86 percent success rate and our success rate is zero. You know like the boys ranch they keep them busy doing daily chores, milking cows, putting up hay or hauling bales. These kids have to have some type of responsibility this is a tough one, you can't just keep giving and giving. I've done it myself and it don't work. It must be awful tough to quit this drug no matter what you do if you choose to quit it has to be in your heart to do it. When they get out of treatment what they going to do? They don't have a job or a car. My sister does that for them she helps them get a job, gets them a place to live, she really helps them. Her program is successful she's in Bismarck and she does this on her own.

As we visited, I asked Ivan what advice he would share for anyone wanting to ranch. "I'd say get an 8 hour day job that you love to do then you never have to do a days work in your life and that seems tough. You gotta like it because it's not an eight-hour job, this is something you really got to love to do and like it because you know there's not a whole lot of money in it. Sometimes I wonder why with all them tough years you know I went broke several times but you keep doing it. I would say never quit don't give up there's time I sure wanted to. In any job if you love your job then it's not even like you have a job you know because you like it. It's lot tougher to start for a young person unless he had some kind of help because there's no way you can buy cattle, equipment and expect them to make it that's ain't in the books. One other thing you have to plan from one year to the next it's so much harder now to get leases, most of our land are leased to non-Indians. It makes it hard for a guy who lives here, whose enrolled here born and raised here to ranch anymore. It's like they're driving ranchers away, I would say that would be the hardest part to get

enough pasture now to run your operation and that's always a bother. You can't just plan one day or the next with this kind of operation, I have to plan a year or two in advance like the hay, there ain't going to be any hay. I've been fortunate enough we get hay and feed that we buy from different places. We're pretty fortunate that way, I got some friends up by Trenton that I've known for years and they had some irrigated stuff so we buy what they have then we buy the big toppings up in Sidney, Montana.

Like many of our people here who deal with diabetes and kidney problems, Ivan knows first hand when he developed kidney problems. As he says; "We have to deal with referrals and the insurance that our tribe has for our members." A while back Ivan had to go to the Mayo Clinic, he had a kidney transplant. As he explains; "When I first went to Indian Health Service they wouldn't do anything. When I got to Mayo, I had to shell out \$50,000 before they even did any testing. Then I had a brain tumor which was removed. I now have to go back to Mayo because the tumor came back. Then I have to deal with referrals, referrals and I just called them and I was told they haven't heard anything yet. You have to wait for the clinic here to send the referral then they told me maybe next week. I said, if you had a brain tumor wouldn't you kinda be in a hurry. They're really slow at the New Town clinic. If you were really sick, you know, you might be in trouble. If you go without a referral, than you have to pay. The insurance the tribe gave us needs to be straighten out. If you're sick then you will be damn sick if your running back and forth to the clinic for referrals. He laughs but it's true. I will leave it at that or we'll still be here waiting for breakfast in the morning he laughs.

People ask me when are you going to retire, or go on vacation? I have no desire to go on a vacation or retire. I may retire by doing less work but I won't completely leave it. I've been raising quarter horses now and I sent some five to North Carolina and another eight are going to California to a production sale out there in the next few days so that's been kinda fun. I sold some local and I have a trainer out in Great Falls, Montana. I have some guys breaking some horses for me in Hurbert, Wyoming who are really good

at what they do. I sent some to Oklahoma. This is the part I don't mind traveling, when we do, we don't take time to look around it's just boom, boom straight through and back. We just stop for fuel and hit the road. The older you get you have more pit stops to make he laughs. I just want to add one more thing, I didn't do all this alone I had good help. In closing he goes onto say; "I know its good to see your newspaper come back at least we know what's going on in Mandaree now.

We are all aware that every one goes through struggles and hardships in life. God knows no one is perfect. For some who are fortunate they change their lives. They aren't the same person they were years ago. As for Ivan, he changed his lifestyle and his life. He struggles with his health but through all of that, he works every day, he gives thanks everyday to our Creator God for his many blessings. Ivan is a kind hearted and generous man who believes in helping people out who want to help themselves.

In a recent interview with Tex Hall West Segment News asked him what was being done to ensure the oil companies such as Tesoro/ Marathon are being held responsible?

Tex Hall stated; "The Fort Berthold Allottee Land & Mineral Owners Association has been fighting for equal justice and compensation for

the exact amount that our Tribal Council received \$2 million dollars per acre. We were in federal court however, now we are awaiting a new decision from the BIA Great Plains Regional Director. Thru Secretary Deb Haaland's Office, The Acting Secretary rescinded the previous Trump Administrations decision which awarded way less than what our Tribal Council received. For those of you not familiar with this case, our Tribal Council used our allottee land to receive their \$ 2 Million dollars per acre. That is so unheard of and so illegal without the allottee landowners consent.

Since the last eight years of Tesoro/Marathon trespassing. The FBALMOA has accomplished a lot. According to Hall he states; "We have helped many families with their land concerns, ie pipeline trespass, Tribal Section 17 trespass, spills, fires, and landowner education. We had a successful fundraiser that was run by one of our very own tribal member Peyton Martin Gay.

According to Tex Hall, they have attorney's working for FBALMOA who are Pringle & Herigstad a law firm out of Minot. Reed Soderstrom is the main attorney working on our case. For any landowner or enrolled member that has any questions, feel free to go on our facebook page; Fort Berthold Land and Mineral Owner Association.

It was also stated that the Allottee Face Book page was held hostage by a tribal member so Tex Hall started this page up and dropped the word Allottee. Just incase anyone is confused.

Tex will answer for the next issue on another question for West Segment News. He doesn't want to confuse the two so we just stayed on with the Tesoro trespass issue.

Never in the history has our Tribal Council went against their own people so blatantly.

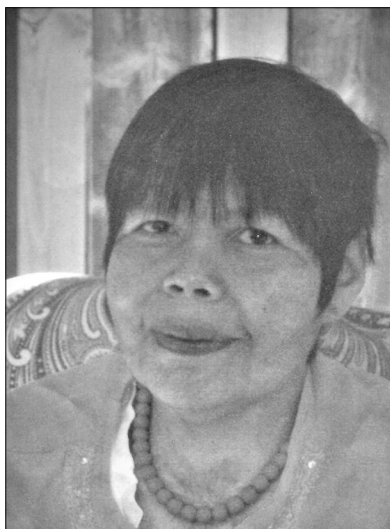

classes which began on June 12, 19, 27 and started again on July 3rd via zoom.

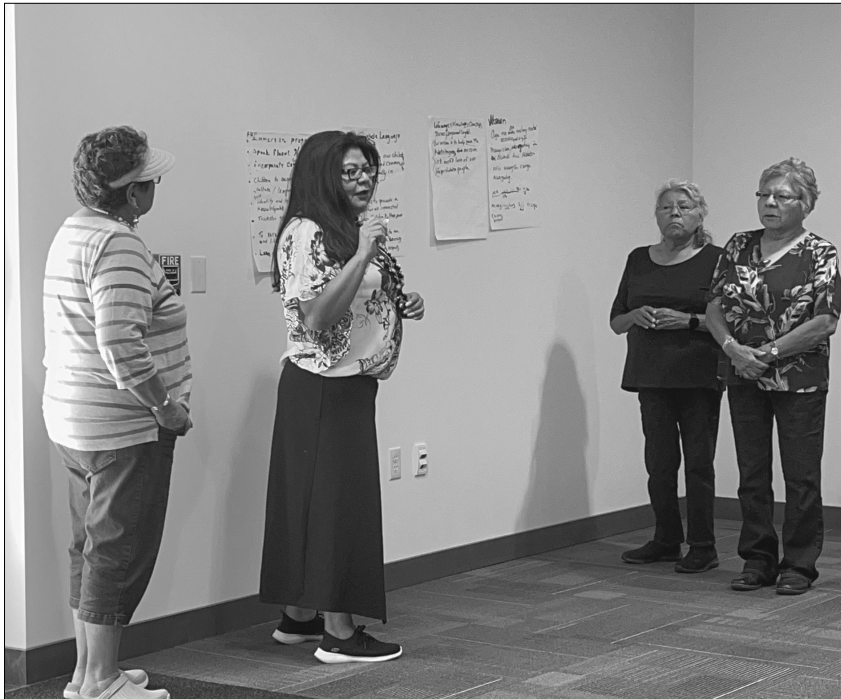

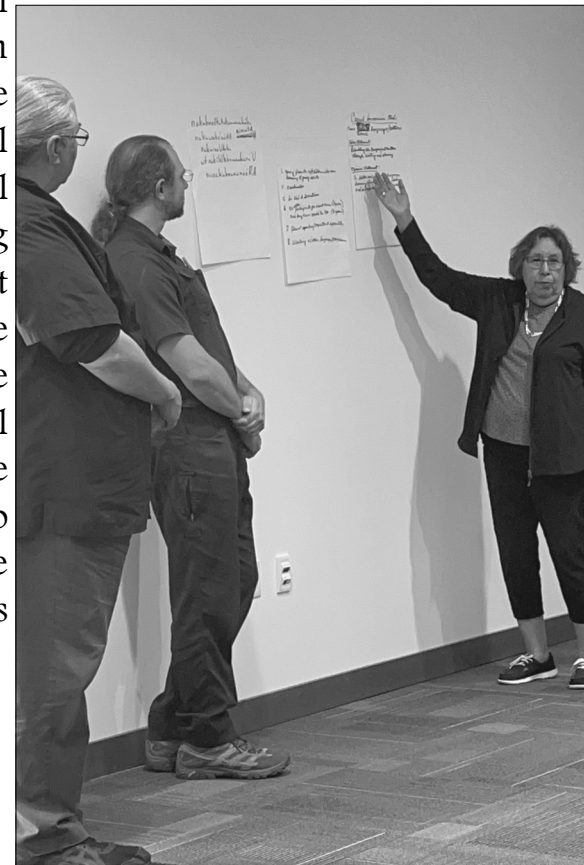
Ongoing training and professional development will be provided to all instructors, elders and participants as appropriate for the success of Maagarishda Hidatsa Nest.

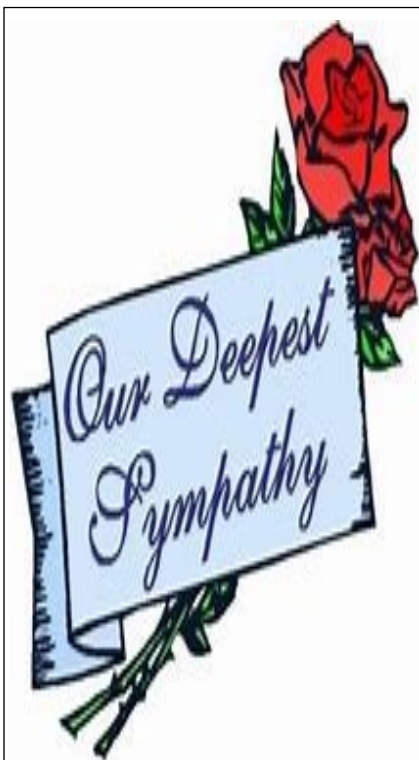
